Most Counties with 250+ Species

With all the birding time needed to move up in this list, sometimes taking a decade in a county to get past 250, it's quite noteworthy to report on Mike Madsen's jump into a first place tie after he passed this threshold in two counties during 2009! Eric Secker's tally is new to this list, and Travis Mahan was the only other person to add another 250+ county during the past year.

Most Counties with 200+ Species

Amazingly, this list was the most active among the three in this 'category' with 11 birders on this list showing increases. Doug Stotz had the largest upward move after his 2009 efforts led to three of his county tallies eclipsing this barrier. Both Eric Secker and Darrell Shambaugh join this list for the first time.

Christmas Bird Count - Life Lists

Five birders increased their lists in 2009, highlighted by the increase of four on Craig Taylor's list. In contrast to the SBC Life List, there are many more counts spanning a couple weeks, which should make it easier to grow your tally. On the flip side, there's on average about 45% fewer species around. A birder can reach 100 species in their region, although it might take a decade to do it. A quicker way to breach 100 is to participate on a deep Southern Illinois count, where you can easily get a few species that would be considered challenging to find up north.

This is a first-time list where a birder counts all the species they find while participating on an IOS field trip. This year's list starts with only one birder, but Craig Taylor's 268 is a remarkably high kickoff to this list. (100 minimum)

Buddy List

No sooner was the Augustine-Richmond tally highlighted last year as the standard bearer for this list that a new pair of 'buddies' has eclipsed their mark. The Fishers report for the first time with an amazing 369 Illinois species seen together, a tally that most birders don't have by themselves! Kuesel-Taylor added 17 species, enough to move them into the third position, just a species ahead of the Harrison-Shelby team, which added 11 species. Sanders-Stokie report for the first time and their 316 comes in as the fifth highest on the overall list. The next highest tally among the new 'buddies' was that of the Neise-Skrentny team, which started birding together on March 23rd and ended the year with 298 species! The Anderson-Anzia team added an impressive 37 species in 2009, the most of any returning buddy team.

Regional Big Years

It was a record-breaking year for those doing an Illinois Big Year, so perhaps it's not surprising that one of the oldest listing records, the Northern Illinois Big Year, was also broken in 2009. Eric Walters sets a new standard for this list with his 295, breaking the 19-year-old record of 286. Only one species separated him from Alan Stokie's 294, which also exceeded the old record by more than 3%. Also noteworthy are Mike Madsen and Doug Stotz's tallies, which currently stands as the fourth and fifth best annual tallies in the northern region. Another record fell in 2009, this time in the central region, when Jim Mountjoy passes last year's record-breaking tally by two species. With the central region so large and with the other two regions showing 290+ potential, one would think the central might see additional future top tallies in the years to come.

Early Dates (top five)

The highlight of these lists is the new record set in the 'earliest to 300,' where four birders reached the magic number far earlier than ever before. Pete Moxon reached 300 on May 30th, when he added Brown Pelican, Western Kingbird and Yellow-crowned Night-Heron. Both Mike Baum and Craig Taylor achieved the second quickest to 250 species when they hit that mark on May 8th. Next year we'll expand this list to include the top 10 for each species threshold.
