And you also helped keep Meadowlark going. We've published four issues annually for 15 years, with this issue beginning our 16th volume.

If you still have Volume 1, Number 1, compare it with this issue and notice how much we've grown while maintaining our mission. That first year, 15 persons and organizations gave us seed money to get IOS and the Meadowlark off the ground. Today, we have 106 patrons, sponsors, supporters and contributors including individuals and organizations. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

Though, of course, Meadowlark, is important to me, and those funds help keep us afloat, that money also has helped IOS establish a scholarship grant to help pay for research on the birds we love to watch in Illinois. I never imagined I'd be editing a state ornithological journal for so long – but it's just in my blood, I guess, and it's also thanks to you, the IOS supporters. Illinois' first breeding Trumpeter Swans in modern times, with comments on national and Midwestern reintroduction programs

The magnificent Trumpeter Swan, "the largest of all North American wildfowl, belongs to a vanishing race; though once common throughout all of the central and northern portions of the continent, it has been gradually receding before the advance of civilization and agriculture. . ."

Before sunrise 29 May 2006, Eric Walters was moments away from stepping into the dawning of a new day for Trumpeter Swans (*Cygnus buccinator*) in Illinois. As he slowly drove over the Route 84 railroad bridge at Savanna in Carroll County, he noted two Trumpeter Swans with one sitting on top of an abandoned muskrat lodge. There were four eggs on the nest, confirming that the first Illinois Trumpeter Swan nesting in modern times was under way.

As a result of intensive reintroduction efforts in the upper Midwest during the past several decades, pairs of Trumpeter Swans have been seen in Illinois as potential nesters within the past few years. In spring 2005, two trumpeters took up residence for a short time in late April at Cook County's McGinnis Slough. Wes Serafin (pers. comm.) said two unbanded Trumpeters were at McGinnis Slough 17 April 2005 and one was sitting on an old muskrat lodge. No nesting

was confirmed and later in the summer only one bird was seen. Paul Dacko (via IBET, the Illinois birding list serve) also found a pair of Trumpeters in 2005 at Lake Katherine, Cook County. He saw them 11 March 2005 and photographed them 11 May 2005. Since these swans were not banded, it's impossible to be completely sure, but it's likely the pair at McGinnis and at Lake Katherine were the same.

In addition, in 2005, four swans were present at Spring Lake in northwestern Illinois along the backwaters of the Mississippi River in Carroll County into July. Another pair was spending time at Carson Slough, a small private wetland on the north side of Carroll County. None of these pairs was documented as breeding.

In 2006, several pairs of Trumpeter Swans were observed in Carroll County. The pair that raised young selected a roughly 35-acre marsh bordered on the north and south by an active railroad track and on the east by a busy road with homes less than 200 yards away. One of the many muskrat lodges, seemingly a feature in all the marshes being considered for nesting by these swans in the Midwest, was chosen as their home. On 29 May, Eric Walters observed the female turning and then sitting upon four eggs, which were laid on the rooftop of the lodge. The male, with neck-collar 1H9, was hatched and reared in 2004 at Chicago's Lincoln Park Zoo, part of the zoo's breeding program that started in 1991. The female, with neck-

collar OC6, was born in 2003 and raised in captivity in Iowa. Both were released into the wild near the Mississippi River in Iowa.

On 6 June 2006, Lawrence Casey observed an American Crow dive bombing and attacking one of the cygnets, with repeated strong blows to the young bird. The adults watched with no reaction and made no attempt to defend their young. It is unclear if something was wrong with the young or whether the captive-rearing of the adults may have led to atypical behavior, in which they did not learn predatorial defense tactics (S. Bailey pers. comm.). Only one juvenile survived through at least early winter, being seen with its parents in middle November, a few miles south of the nesting site.



Illinois history

Trumpeter Swans once bred along the larger river valley regions of Illinois where sizeable backwater marshes and sloughs were formerly common. They may have also nested in the state's prairie potholes, but mention of this in the literature is scant.

Schorger (1964) writes of an expedition in 1673, when Father Marquette recounted flightless Trumpeter

Swans at the end of summer. No other swan species would be in Illinois during that time. Marquette's writings make it clear that swans nested in abundance on his journey in the river valleys and backwater marshes of Illinois, and his travels took him very near where the Trumpeter Swans nested in 2006.

A trading trip to Illinois was made in 1710 by a man named Kellogg. His party reached the Illinois River by way of the Chicago River and wrote that they had seen an 'infinite number of wild fowl, such as Cranes, Geese, Duck and Swans' and that they were feeding on wild oats and ripe plums (Schorger 1964). "Since the plums were edible, the time was the last of August or early September. No migratory swans would arrive near Chicago this early so that they must have been resident Trumpeters," wrote Schorger.

Other indications that Trumpeter Swans historically nested in Illinois include Parmalee's (1958) account of the discovery of 375 Trumpeter Swan bones in pre-1600 Indian burial sites

in Will, St. Clair and Calhoun counties. Indians obtained Trumpeter Swans for food and ornaments when the species became flightless while molting from late June to mid-August (Bohlen 1989). However, it is possible these bones could have been traded between tribes in other regions.

Schorger (1964) also recounts an 1870 northwest Indiana nesting and an 1893 south-central Wisconsin nesting, roughly 50 miles from Rockford, Illinois. The last time a Trumpeter Swan was confirmed nesting in Illinois remains in question. Recent reports in the Chicago Tribune and Brookfield Zoo press releases indicating a trumpeter nested in Glenview in the 1840s are inaccurate – no documentation can be found

pointing to these statements. The safest, most accurate statement is that Trumpeter Swans were likely extirpated as a breeder in Illinois by the 1880s (Bohlen 1989).

The Carroll County family of 2006 left their marsh 22 October 2006, and moved in mid-November to Lower Spring Lake, roughly two miles south from their breeding site. Since these swans are loyal to their successful nest sites and have life expectancies nearing three decades, it's easy to see a bright future for this pair with their nesting site potentially becoming the epicenter of an increasing Illinois breeding population. The chances are great for a growing breeding population of Trumpeter Swans in Illinois. Indeed, the pair returned to the same nesting site by roughly 20 May 2007. And Anne Straight reported that the Trumpeter Swan male (1H9) and female (OC6) had four cygnets 6 June 2007 at the same location they bred in 2006. On 14 June 2007, as this article went to press, two adults remained sentinel on either side of the four cygnets as the youngsters fed for at least 30 minutes (pers. comm. S. Bailey).

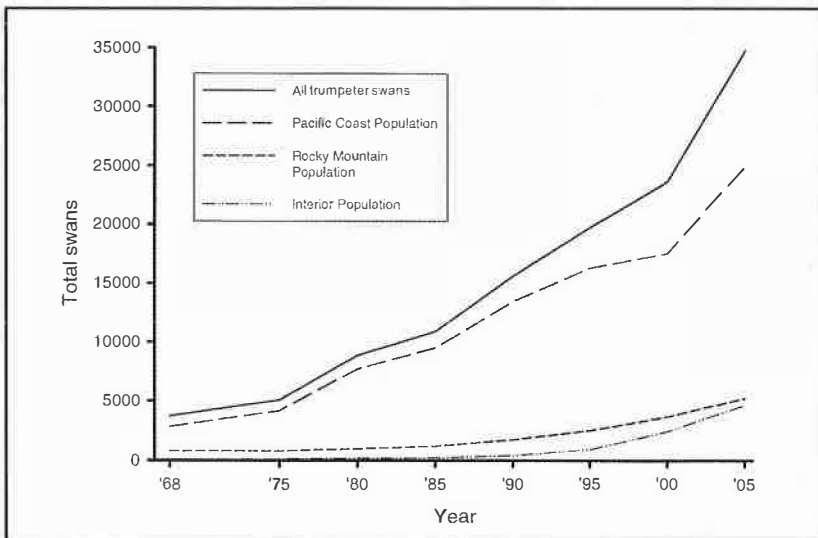


Figure 1. Total North American and population-specific trumpeter swan abundance estimates resulting from quinquennial trumpeter swan surveys, 1968-2005. Source: U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

National and Midwestern perspective

Historically, Trumpeter Swans occurred across much of the northern United States and Canada, breeding or wintering. (Matteson et al. 1995) Some controversy exists as to whether Trumpeter Swans ever bred in Ohio and the rest of the Northeastern United States (Whan 2000). Destruction of habitat along with market hunting caused a decline in the nesting populations during the 19th century. Swan skins, mostly from trumpeters, were used to decorate ladies' hats in England and the U.S., and by 1932 this species was thought to have been extinct in the Midwest (Banko 1960). Reports from early adventurers indicated that the swan eggs were easy to collect, and that could have led to the species' decline as well.

The discovery of a small nonmigratory population of Trumpeter Swans in remote Montana, Idaho and Wyoming in the early 1900s, including a nest at Yellowstone National Park in 1919 (Matteson et. al 1995), gave conservationists hope that this species could be helped.

Surprisingly, though Trumpeters were first identified in Alaska in 1850, it was not until 1954 that breeding trumpeters were discovered there.

Three cygnets were produced at the first nesting of Trumpeter Swans in modern time in Illinois in 2006. Only one survived.

An extensive survey of known Alaska breeding habitat in 1968 by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service revealed that 2,844 trumpeters were living in the state. (Rosenberg and Rothe 1994). A 1990 census showed 13,000 trumpeters in Alaska, which is roughly 80 percent of the world's population.

Though most birders consider Trumpeter Swan reintroduction and protection efforts to have begun fairly recently, perhaps only as far back as two decades ago, much was being done even in the 1930s. For example, the federal government created the Red Rock Lakes National Wildlife Refuge in Montana in 1935 to help protect a Trumpeter Swan population there. And in 1938, four Trumpeter Swan cygnets were placed at the National Elk Refuge in Jackson, Wyoming. "A total of 40 Trumpeters from Red Rock Lakes NWR formed the core of the Midwest's restoration

effort in the late 1960s," wrote Matteson et al. (1995).

Conservation efforts continued, helping the swans return to areas where they hadn't been found for decades. Matteson et. al (1995) state that Minnesota's Hennepin Parks pioneered the effort to re-establish Trumpeter Swans in 1966. Along with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, individual states including Michigan, Wisconsin and Ohio began reintroduction programs in the 1980s and Iowa soon followed in 1994. Cygnets are reared in captivity and then released after two years at select wetlands. The states manage these programs and some reintroduced birds were born at local zoos including Lincoln Park and Brookfield Zoos in northern Illinois.



U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service continent-wide survey data from 2005 indicate that all three Trumpeter populations (Pacific Coast, Rocky Mountain, and Interior) are doing well with 34,000 counted between May 2005 and January 2006 (Moser 2006). A U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service graphic shows the increase in Trumpeter Swan numbers from 1968 to 2006, with the largest increase in the Pacific Coast Population. (See Figure 1.)

Successes

Minnesota has now established at least 15 pairs of nesting swans in the western part of the state and now is working in southern Minnesota. (Matteson et al. 1995). In 1995, 11 pairs of Trumpeter Swans were nesting in Wisconsin (Matteson et al. 1995). Today the population of Trumpeter Swans in Wisconsin is estimated to include 96 breeding pairs among more than 500 individuals (Matteson, pers. comm.).

In 2000, researchers counted more than 400 individual Trumpeter Swans in Michigan. In a 2005 survey, researchers counted 728 Trumpeter Swans including 188 cygnets statewide in Michigan. (www.michigan.gov).

Until 1988, the last wild nesting trumpeter in Iowa occurred in 1883 on the Twin Lakes Wildlife Area southwest of Belmond, Iowa in Hancock County (www.iowagov). Three cygnets hatched from a wild pair in Dubuque County in 1998, with the pair hatching 5 in 1999 and again in 2000. A second pair nested on a Winnebago County Conservation Board wetland in Iowa and produced 5 eggs, none of which hatched. The Iowa DNR added a sixth viable egg to the nest, which hatched and bonded the pair to the site.

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources also began a restoration program, resulting in at least 16 breeding pairs, with nearly all hatching young. (www.dnr.state.oh.us/wildlife/resources/projects/swanup

date.htm — Retrieved 10 June 2007) The Ohio DNR said trumpeters historically nested in marshes along the Detroit River and at the entrance to Lake Erie in Ohio, though Whan (2000) remains convinced no Trumpeters ever bred in the state.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources has had no official Trumpeter Swan reintroduction program. However, for the first time since raising swans at Brookfield and Lincoln Park Zoos to be released in other states, a team of zoo keepers from these two zoos helped release two swans right here in the prairie state. On 30 April 2007, they placed the swans at Johnson Sauk Trail State Park, a 1,365-acre wildlife reserve 40 miles southeast of the Quad Cities. Brookfield Zoo and Lincoln Park Zoo have released 10 and 29 birds respectively into the wild in Iowa (Brookfield Zoo 2007, Gregory 2007).

The future

Though the future looks bright for the Trumpeter Swan in the Midwest and Illinois, threats continue to plague restoration efforts. Loss of wetland habitat is certainly an issue, and these breeding grounds will have to be preserved and restored if the swans are to continue thriving.

Lead poisoning, however, “looms as the single greatest threat to the reestablishment of Trumpeter Swans in the Midwest,” wrote Matteson et al. (1995). A nationwide ban of lead shot occurred in 1991, but lead is still found in wetlands where swans nest. The swans eat grit to aid digestion, and in the process often swallow lead shot. As of late April 2005, the total count of documented mortality from lead poisoning to swans in Washington State, British Columbia and Canada is 1,900 swans, with 97% of the swans Trumpeters and the rest Tundra Swans, according to the Trumpeter Swan Society, founded in 1968. Wintering Trumpeter Swans in Southern Illinois

Introduction

One of the most inspiring conservation success stories in recent years may be that of the Trumpeter Swan (*Cygnus buccinator*). The historic breeding and wintering range of Trumpeter Swans once covered much of North America, including the upper Midwest, the Lower Mississippi River south to the Gulf Coast, and parts of the Atlantic Coast (Banko 1960). By the end of the 19th century, the species was likely extirpated from the midwest. Trumpeter Swans have since made a dramatic recovery and now sightings occur in all Midwestern states, including Illinois. Thanks to reintroduction programs that began almost 50 years ago Trumpeter Swans in the Mid-

west, also known as the Interior Population (IP), numbered more than 4,750 birds in 2005 (Moser 2006).

In 1960, the first reintroduction of Trumpeter Swans to the IP was made in South Dakota (Hansen 1973). The second release took place in 1966 in Minnesota (Hansen 1973). Since the 1960s, many states have initiated reintroduction programs to restore Trumpeter Swans, including Illinois' northern neighbor, Wisconsin. A total of 387 trumpeters were raised and released in Wisconsin between 1989 and 2005 (Matteson, pers. comm.). The original goal of the trumpeter program was to attain a minimum population of 20 breeding, migratory pairs (Ad hoc Swan Committee 1998). The reintroduction was successful, and today the population of Trumpeter Swans in Wisconsin is estimated

to include 96 breeding pairs among more than 500 individuals (Matteson, pers. comm.). More than half of these swans are estimated to migrate to Illinois during the winter (Matteson, pers. comm.).

Issues

Despite these impressive successes, some problems remain. A lack of migratory behaviors and suitable wintering areas is considered to be the greatest obstacle to the complete recovery of the IP to a healthy, self-sustaining population (Mitchell 1994). In some states, a large proportion of the trumpeters do not migrate to wintering sites below 40° N latitude, which runs just north of Springfield, Illinois (Gillette 1997). Swans that remain north during the winter often cannot survive without human intervention such as supplemental feeding, aerators to keep the water open, or power plants that release warm water and keep large stretches of river open throughout the winter. During exceptionally harsh winters these areas may freeze over causing large die-offs among non-migratory birds (Linck 1997, Drewien et al. 2002). If these swans migrated to more appropriate areas to the south, they would not be exposed to this risk during harsh winter conditions. There also are many dangers associated with long migrations. It is unknown whether mortality is higher for migratory or non-migratory populations of Trumpeter Swans. Additionally, there is some concern whether good wintering areas are still available in the south (Mitchell 1994). Most wetlands in southern states, including Illinois, have been drained and converted to agricultural fields (Dahl and Johnson 1991).

Many waterfowl species have adapted to a lack of suitable aquatic habitat by foraging in agricultural fields, usually to their benefit

(Bellrose 1980, Baldassarre and Bolen 1994). Food availability during winter is probably not limited for populations that use agricultural resources (Gates et al. 2001). Traditionally the swan's diet consisted solely of aquatic plants, however, about 30 years ago swans began foraging in grain and produce fields (McKelvey 1981). In southern Illinois, groups of wintering Trumpeter Swans have been observed foraging in agricultural fields (Babineau 2004). It is currently unknown if those agricultural foods meet the energetic and nutritional requirements of Trumpeter Swans.

Research

During the winters of 2001-02 and 2002-03, Faye Babineau, a graduate student in the Cooperative Wildlife Research Lab (CWRL) at Southern Illinois University-Carbondale, conducted a study of Trumpeter Swans wintering in Southern Illinois. She focused on a

population wintering at Burning Star #5 (BS5), a reclaimed surface coal mine located approximately 6 miles east of Desoto, Illinois. Swans were first seen at BS5 in 1994 and the population has increased steadily since. The goals of the project were to determine the size, behavior, and habitat use of the population as well as the timing of migration. She noted that the swans arrived in late November or early December and had all departed by mid-March. She counted 71 trumpeters during the first winter of her study and 77 during the second. She found that the swans were using corn, soybean, and winter wheat fields for feeding. Winter wheat fields seemed to be preferred and were used more than would be expected, according to availability, during both winters. The results of the study suggested that agricultural habitat is able to meet the needs of wintering Trumpeter Swans in southern Illinois (Babineau 2004).

To further test this hypothesis, a second study, funded by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, was initiated through the CWRL at Southern Illinois University-Carbondale in 2005. The goal is to determine the winter habitat conditions that support maximum population growth for IP Trumpeter Swans by estimating survival rates for migratory and non-migratory swans and among swans using different wintering areas. The methods include Trumpeter Swan flock surveys and activity time budgets to establish habitat use patterns and re-sighting neck-collars and leg bands to determine survival rates.

Currently, there are three large groups of trumpeters that winter in, or very near, Illinois that totaled over 380 individuals during the winter of 2005-06. More than 100 trumpeters stayed on or near BS5 during the winter of 2005-06. About 140 trumpeters wintered at the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers Riverlands Migratory Bird Sanctuary (Riverlands) on the Mississippi River between West Alton, Missouri, and Alton, Illinois. More than 130 trumpeters were seen

Figure 1. Percent of daylight hours spent in various habitat types by Trumpeter Swans at two study sites during the winter of 2005-06.

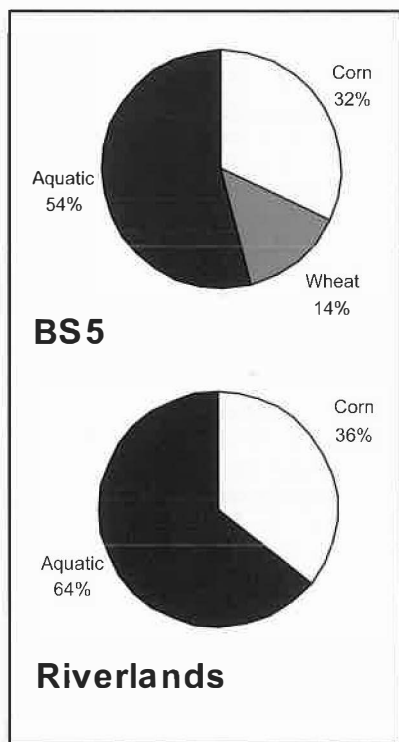
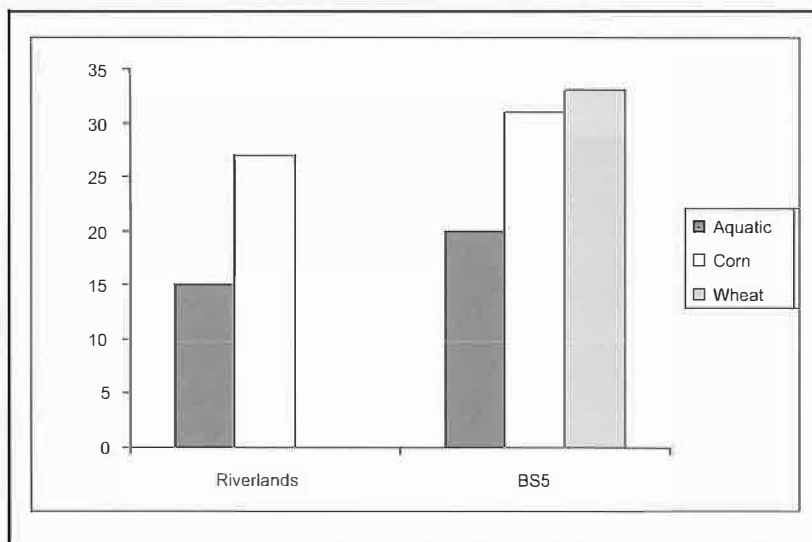


Figure 2. Percent of time spent foraging while in various habitat types by Trumpeter Swans at two study sites during the winter of 2005-06.

on or near Peabody Coal Company's reclaimed Universal Mine (Universal) that spans the border between Illinois and Indiana, 9 miles east of Paris, Illinois. More than 40% of those swans were neck-collared and 162 collars were identified during that winter. A smaller flock of about 40 uncollared trumpeters was also recorded near the town of Wolf Lake in southern Illinois for most of the winter.

Surveys were conducted from 24 November 2005 – 2 March 2006 to determine habitat use at both BS5 and Riverlands. During that time period over 32 hours of activity time budget observations at BS5 and over 85 hours at Riverlands were made. Preliminary results from this season suggest that habitat used for foraging varied between trumpeters wintering at BS5 and those at Riverlands. Trumpeter Swans at BS5 were observed in wheat fields 14% of the time, while swans were never observed in wheat at Riverlands (See Fig.1). Swans used corn 32% of the time at BS5 and 36% of the time at Riverlands. The activity time budgets showed that swans at Riverlands spent 28% of their time foraging when in corn fields while those at BS5 spent 32% of their time foraging while in crop fields with very little difference between corn and wheat (See Fig. 2). These results imply that corn at both sites and wheat at BS5 make up a substantial part of the winter diet of Trumpeter Swans. Swans at both sites were also seen foraging in aquatic habitats. Seasonal survival estimates for swans wintering at these sites will determine whether differences in the winter diet may be affecting survival rates of swans.

Swans were also observed on the Wisconsin breeding grounds during the summer of 2006. Fifty-one collars were re-sighted from May to August in the central Wisconsin counties of Wood, Juneau, and Jackson. Of those 51 collars, 45 had been seen at BS5

during the previous winter. It appears that the majority of the collared swans wintering at BS5 originated in central Wisconsin. According to banding records, swans at Riverlands during the winter seem to be migrating from northern Wisconsin and those at Universal come mainly from Burnett County in northeastern Wisconsin.

During the winter of 2006-07 populations at all three sites grew. There were over 125 trumpeters at BS5 and over 160 at both Riverlands and Universal. Almost 200 collars were recorded at those three sites. An additional 7 collared birds were found within two small populations of about a dozen each, one near Wolf Lake and the other just east of Harrisburg. Over 75% of the collars seen during the winter of 2005-06 were seen during the winter of 2006-07. Work for the 2006-07 winter season began 26 November and, as of this writing, is in progress. The Riverlands population has been observed foraging in corn and soybean fields while those at BS5 have been using corn, winter wheat, and soybeans thus far. Habitat use surveys and time budgets are also being conducted at Universal. This population has been observed foraging in corn and soybeans to date. Swans at Riverlands and Universal have rarely been observed in winter wheat fields. This is likely due to a lack of suitable winter wheat fields at those sites.

The IP has more than doubled since 2000. Despite this dramatic growth many Trumpeter Swans cannot be considered self-sustaining because they remain in the north during the winter, congregating in a few small areas where they are artificially

provided with food. Our project will help determine whether winter feeding is needed to maintain the population or should be discontinued to encourage swans to migrate to more southerly habitats. This will demonstrate the value of maintaining habitat for wintering trumpeter swans in Illinois and other southern states. Our project will also help wildlife managers to determine whether current winter habitat conditions in Illinois are adequate to supply nutritional requirements of the objective swan populations.

Scarlet Tanager assists Summer Tanager with nesting activities in Cook County

Summer Tanagers (*Piranga rubra*) appear every spring in Cook County, but their nearest breeding sites in Illinois are to the south and southwest, in Kankakee and Will Counties. Doug Stotz of Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History has found Summer Tanagers in Cook County during June in eight of the past ten years. In 1996, Craig Thayer reported a male Summer Tanager at Swallow Cliff Forest Preserve in southwest Cook County from June through 1 August; and in 1997, I observed a female and two fighting males there on 15 June.

In late May and early June of 2006, there were several sightings of Summer Tanagers at Swallow Cliff along a trail where Scarlet Tanagers (*Piranga olivacea*) breed annually. Both species were sometimes found sharing the same tree. On 10 June, Cindy Alberico pointed out a female Summer Tanager giving scolding calls repeatedly for more than five minutes. Similar reports continued for two weeks, and I determined that

I would spend my next weekend looking for evidence of breeding.

Summer Tanager nesting confirmed in Cook County

Walter Marcisz, Sue Friscia, her niece, and I went to the tanager trail on 8 July, and we soon discovered very promising evidence of breeding: A male Summer Tanager was carrying a caterpillar in its beak. We followed the male for 10-15 minutes as he flew from tree to tree, then finally to a nest on which a female was sitting. The male fed the caterpillar to the female, confirming that a nesting attempt was underway. The nest was about 25 feet above ground, over a multi-use trail that loops west, then south, from the parking lot at Swallow Cliff. The nest site is consistent with information in Robinson's (1996) Birds of North America account of Summer Tanager, which notes that this species prefers to nest above an open area in the woods. This is the first documented nesting of Summer Tanager in Cook County, Illinois.

In a 10 July posting to IBET, the Illinois birding list-serve, Jerry Kumery mentioned scores of cross-country runners, joggers, and moms walking with kids and strollers trafficking below the nest, with no apparent disturbance to the birds.

Both tanager species males feed young

An intriguing twist developed in the saga soon after the discovery of the nest, when the female Summer Tanager was seen being fed by a male Scarlet Tanager. Two young were visible in the nest beginning 10 July, and

these were fed by males of both Summer and Scarlet Tanagers.

On 13 July, Paul Dacko obtained photos of a male Scarlet Tanager removing a fecal sac from the nest. The males of the two species were also seen aggressively attacking one another, while the female Summer Tanager repeatedly chased the male Scarlet. These observations gave rise to questions about the true male parent. Since Robinson's account cited above lists only one previous instance of a Summer x Scarlet Tanager hybrid (a male discovered in a collection of skins in Omaha in 1892; see McCormick 1893), and since the nest was indeed being maintained by a pair of Summer Tanagers, hybrid parentage seemed unlikely.

Steve Bailey of the Illinois Natural History Survey provided a likely scenario for the role of the Scarlet Tanager in the nesting. He postulated that the male Scarlet Tanager had had its nest (and possibly its mate) predated and was following its instinct to keep feeding young. Bailey noted that such behavior is amply documented, even across boundaries of essentially unrelated families of birds.

John Duran noted both young still in the nest on 15 July, being fed by males of both species of tanagers. The following morning, only one young remained in the nest. Duran saw this nestling take its first flight at about 10 a.m., again tended by the two males. The status of the second nestling and the female remain unknown.



I located the male Summer Tanager feeding a fledgling (which I photographed) in a bush about five feet off the ground on 19 July; this was the last date the species was seen.

Observations of nesting Red-headed Woodpeckers at Bluff Spring Fen, Cook County

During the week of 7 July 2006, I had an enjoyable time observing adult Red-headed Woodpeckers (*Melanerpes erythrocephalus*) foraging for food for their offspring at the Bluff Spring Fen in South Elgin, Cook County. These birds are expert flyers, and the remarkable thing about them is their ability to catch insects in mid-flight. They can fly straight up or down from a perch, in any direction while airborne, and can turn on a dime. When the wind accelerates, the woodpeckers prefer to hunt for bugs

on the tree trunks and branches. I observed the woodpeckers capturing many insects in this manner. The insect was prepared for their young by smashing it into the tree with their beaks. Afterward, the parent would fly back to the cavity nest hole, turn its head to listen, and present the

insect to the young. Several presentations were made before the nestlings would take their meal. Sometimes the parents would eat the insects after killing them. At times the birds would cache the extra bugs in cracks in the bark of the cottonwood trees.

A Red-headed Woodpecker is superbly adapted to its way of living. For foraging and nesting, its body must cling and hammer into hard surfaces. A woodpecker braces with its tail as it moves up and down the tree

trunk. Large muscles support stiff tail feathers, allowing easy manipulation. The two, pointed central feathers, reinforced by longitudinal ridge, have barbs curving toward the tree, which further strengthens the tail.

Most birds have anisodactyl feet, three toes forward, one backward. Woodpeckers have zygodactyl feet, two toes forward and two toes backwards. The rear toes improve the sup-

port needed on vertical surfaces. One toe can be extended laterally as the bird moves up a tree.

The second week of July 2007, a storm with high winds blew through Northwest Chicagoland. One of the two dead snags where the woodpeckers were nesting fell down. A volunteer checked the downed snag and reported the Red-headed Woodpecker's nest tree was still standing. However, I returned on several occasions and could not find any sign of woodpeckers. I never did see the hatchlings or juveniles.

Red-headed Woodpeckers excavate their nests in isolated snags, up to 80 feet above the ground, in open woodlands. Removal of dead trees, loss of open wood lots and competition with European Starlings for nest sites are a few reasons for this species' decline. John Fitzpatrick, executive director of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, has said he fears this species will go extinct if something is not done to protect their habitat.

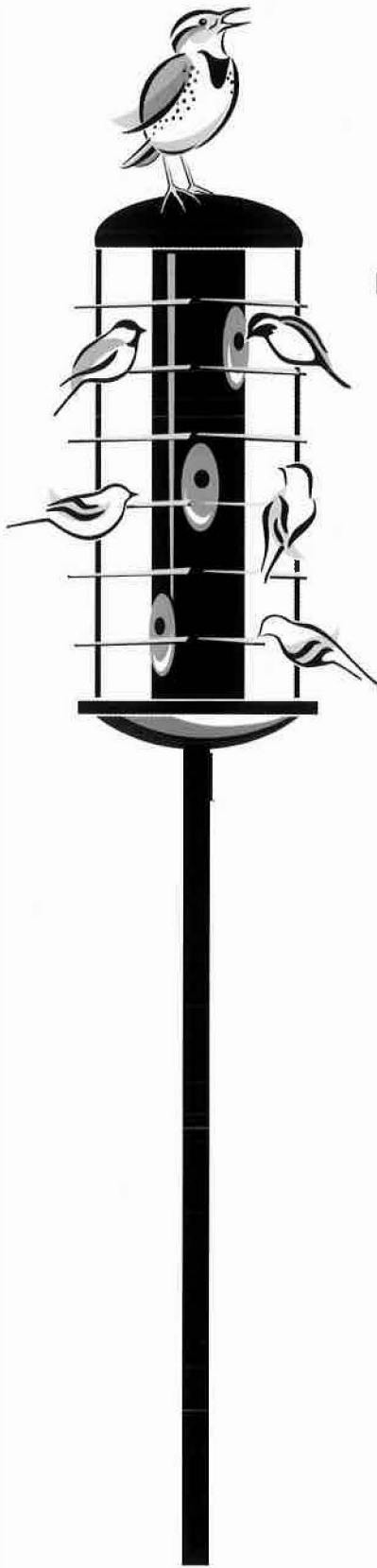

Reflections on backyard birding throughout Illinois

Hot bird!

To many birders that conjures up the image of a just located rarity – like the Reddish Egret seen by many at the Chicago Botanic Garden earlier this spring. Karen and I are very much part of that community of birders. We've chased a lot of hot birds, sometimes having the good fortune to discover one ourselves and then experience the joy and excitement of spreading the word so other birders can try and see it, other times reading or hearing about a rarity, then rushing out to the car to make a short (or long) trek to try and see it (not always successfully).

But today those two words have a different meaning to me. It's 90+°F in our yard, not a breath of wind is stirring, and the southwestern suburbs of Chicago where we live are in the grip of an early summer drought and heat wave. The tiny creek bordering our back yard is down to a trickle, drying up for half its length during the midday heat. It feels more like late July than mid June.

Our Illinois breeding birds are generally well-adapted to handle summer's heat, but heat plus drought adds an extra level of stress as they raise their young. The thermoregulation of their metabolism (to keep their body temperature constant) is actually more difficult when the ambient temperature gets high. In fact birds can die more quickly when subjected to heat stress than when exposed to exceptionally cold weather. Smaller songbirds especially, more rapidly absorb heat from the environment

and lose water faster than larger species. Of course birds don't sweat, but there is a very small moisture loss through their skin. We've all seen their principal method of cooling – panting for evaporative cooling. As the air temperature increases, panting rates necessarily also must increase. One reference I checked reported that the evaporative respiration/panting rate of a House Sparrow increases from 57/minute at 86°F to 160/minute at 109°F.

Bird species inhabiting hot, and dry (desert-like) environments developed a specific metabolic adaptation governing thermoregulation – a lower basal metabolic rate (BMR) than similarly sized birds found in more temperate climates. What does this mean? They burn less energy at whatever they're doing (and therefore generate less heat) than a similarly sized bird living in a temperate woodland, for example. This adaptive strategy allows many species to survive and prosper in an extremely inhospitable desert environment. Ornithologists are still trying to figure out whether there's a direct correlation between lower BMR and aridity. The most recent studies suggest birds occupying either hot and dry or hot and wet (tropical) climates both exhibit lower BMRs than temperate climate birds. So it may not be the humidity, just the constant heat, which led to the adaptation.

Our backyard birds, mostly temperate woodland birds, don't have this built in lower BMR. They need a reliable water source to replace the

water they lose when it's really hot and dry. Even though right now they probably want to go sit in the shade during the heat of the day and do nothing (sounds like a plan for a hot day), they can't. Food has to be found and nestlings have to be fed. More searching, more flying generates more heat, requiring increased water intake for enhanced evaporative cooling. They also readily choose to bathe, as another method for lowering their body temperature.

When it's hot and dry, that bird-bath you keep filled, that dripper splashing on a rock in the shade, or the mister spraying droplets onto a leafy branch, is not just an issue of comfort, it's a matter of survival, for both the parents and their offspring. Healthy, well-hydrated adult birds are much better able to function and find food to bring to the nest. Virtually all species nesting in or near our back yards produce altricial young, born without feathers. The nestlings have essentially no ability to thermoregulate until they're a week or more old. The only moisture they receive is via

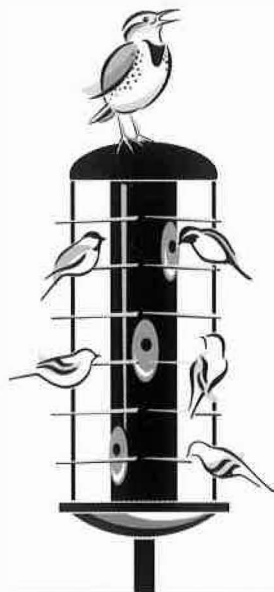
the prey insects stuffed into their mouth. They depend on their parents to keep them warm, or to keep them cool by shading them from the hot sun using the parent's body as the shade. Once they've fledged, they too must quickly learn to find and use water for drinking and bathing.

Just recently, Karen and I were onlookers to just how the adults teach that behavior, and how quickly the youngsters learn. We fill a small cup with water, and suspend our hummingbird feeder from a hook attached to the bottom of the cup. That's to prevent the ants from climbing the feeder pole and gaining direct access to the nectar feeder. Our resident adult Black-capped Chickadee learned several years ago to use that little red cup as its private drinking water stash. Several days ago we watched as begging youngsters followed the adults around. One of the adults flew to the cup and took a drink, with a fledgling close behind. You could almost see the young chickadee thinking, "What's this? Then he took a drink and flew off.

So here's to hot birds, both the kind we chase and the kind we provide a water drip or a birdbath or a mister, to help them cope and survive the summer heat stress right in our own back yard. As global warming increases, our local climate is predicted to get hotter and drier. Yard birders like us will perhaps become increasingly important as providers of small oases for the increasingly stressed bird community that uses our yards.

Field Notes

The 2006 Breeding Season

The 2006 breeding season was mostly hot and dry. Although June temperatures averaged near normal, July temperatures averaged 3-4 degrees above normal and included 100-degree days at least twice. June, for the most part, was dry; rainfall averaged 1 to 2 inches below normal and the measurable rains were limited to the dates of 1 & 28 June. July rainfall averaged 1 to 3 inches below normal; however, measurable amounts did occur on at least nine days during the month. As a result of the rain-free June, it was possible for the annual Breeding Bird Survey routes to be completed on time and with excellent results. I offer my sincere thanks to the state's serious birders who run these important routes each year.

Some of the more interesting 2006 breeding records included the first state nesting for Trumpeter Swans (see below and article in this issue); isolated breeding of several wetland species at Hennepin Lake; fair numbers of Blue-winged Teal, Hooded Mergansers and Pied-billed Grebes; a small colony of Yellow-crowned Night-Herons; more nesting Ospreys (but limited success); more Cooper's Hawks; five pairs of Swainson's Hawks; young King and Virginia Rails and Common Moorhens; two nests of Black-necked Stilts; an expanding population of Monk Parakeets; the June Burrowing Owl; an excellent number of young Ruby-throated Hummingbirds (based on the numbers captured at the hummingbird festivals); a Rufous Hummingbird; first nesting of crows at Des Plaines since the West Nile outbreak; good numbers of Ovenbirds and Cedar Waxwings; the first confirmed nesting of Summer Tanager in Cook County (see article in this issue); good numbers of Grasshopper and Henslow's Sparrows; the first confirmed nesting of Blue Grosbeak in Lake County; and good numbers of Dickcissels.

A few of the disappointing accounts were the gradual demise of the Alorton heron colony—the state's major nesting site for Little Blue Herons and the only site for nesting Snowy Egrets (hopefully the colony is relocating to another protected site); low numbers of nesting Black-crowned Night-Herons (all colonies); lower than expected numbers of Mississippi Kites; no data for Peregrine Falcons; no record of nesting Forster's or Black Terns; low numbers of Capri-mulgids; decreasing numbers of Red-headed Woodpeckers; no Scissor-tailed Flycatchers; low numbers of

shrikes; poor Painted Bunting results; and few reports of nesting Yellow-headed Blackbirds.

Some of the most noteworthy NBSO (non-breeding summer occurrence) records were for geese, dabbling and diving ducks, a Common Loon, large numbers of pelicans, Glossy and White Ibises, several species of gulls and a female Great-tailed Grackle. As for the pelicans, it was an "exceptional summer season for non breeding residents.... Unless summer flooding occurs [at Lake Chautauqua NWR], we'd not be surprised to see nesting attempted on the south pool spoil or the islets in part of the south pool" very soon (RGB). Also, the well-timed de-watering of the south pool and the appearance of mudflats at Lake Chautauqua NWR permitted large numbers of fall-arriving shorebirds to utilize the site (RGB).

The pair of Trumpeter Swans that nested at Savanna (Carroll Co) this year was captive-bred. The female (OC-6) was hatched in 2003, raised in captivity in Iowa and released 20 April 2005 at Green Island Wildlife Management Area in Iowa just across the river from Lost Mound NWR. The male (1 H 9) was hatched in 2004, raised at Lincoln Park Zoo, also released on 20 April 2005, but at Gomer's Marsh about 3 miles north of Clinton, IA and spent most of the winter on the Mississippi River between the Quad Cities and Muscatine, IA. The pair teamed up in the spring and by mid-May had selected a muskrat lodge as a nest site. The first young were detected 9 Jun and two were noted on 21 Jun.

The quality and quantity of reports submitted for this annual compilation increases annually. I offer many thanks to all of you for taking both the time and initiative to submit your notes. This is my last seasonal report. It's been both fun and challenging serving as the compiler of field notes for the past 35 years, initially for all four seasons and more recently for just the breeding season. I encourage everyone to continue submitting seasonal notes to the state compilers to maintain the best record of Illinois' current and changing avifauna.

Some records not printed here may still be under IORC (Illinois Ornithological Records Committee) review; when completed, they will appear in the published IORC report. As standard policy, all observers, regardless of experience, must fully document all unusual observations. Easy to use documentation forms are available from IORC Secretary, Doug

Stotz, Environment and Conservation Program, Field Museum of Natural History, Roosevelt Road and Lake Shore Drive, Chicago, IL 60615. Completed documentation forms of "listed" species should be submitted to the IORC Secretary within one week of the observation.

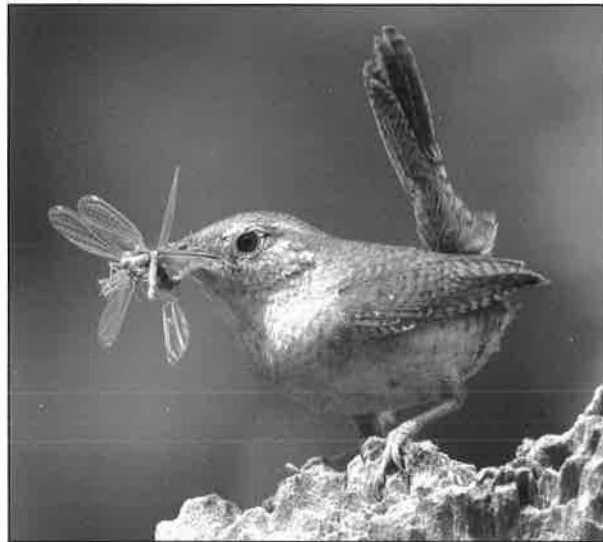
