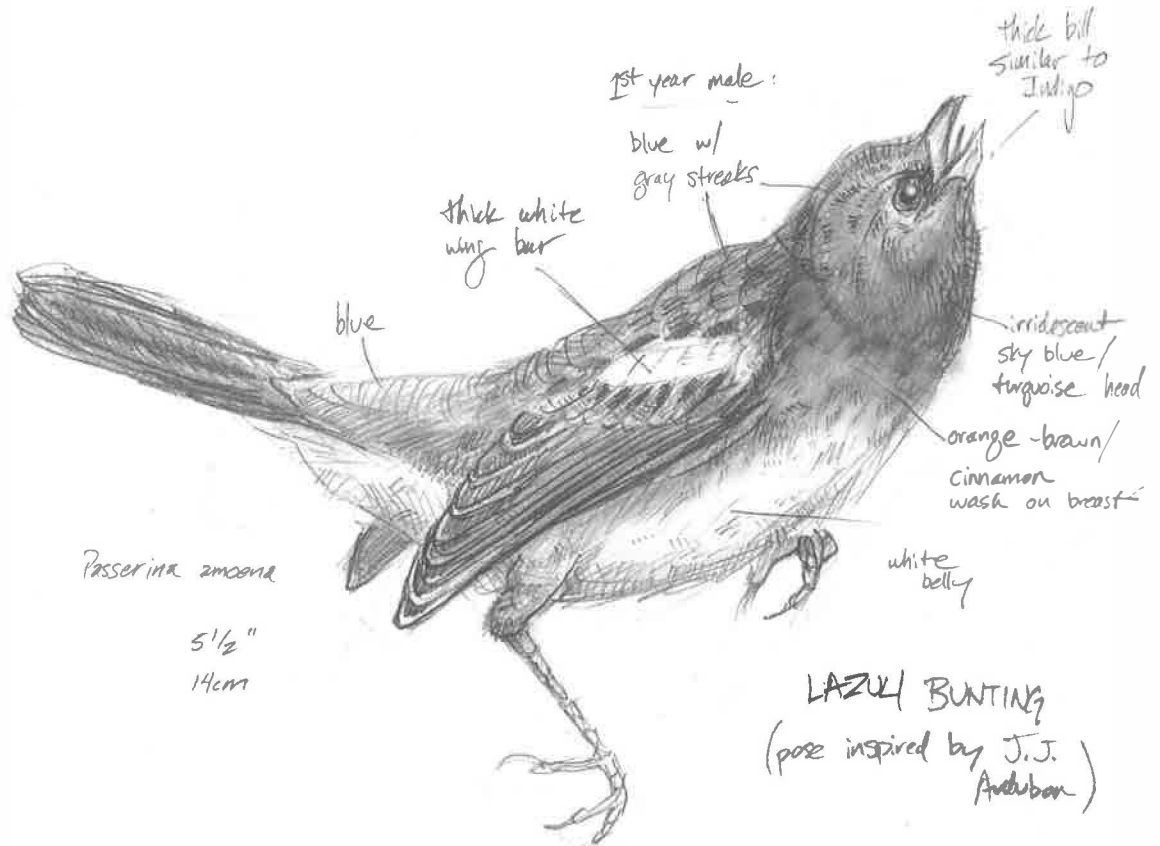


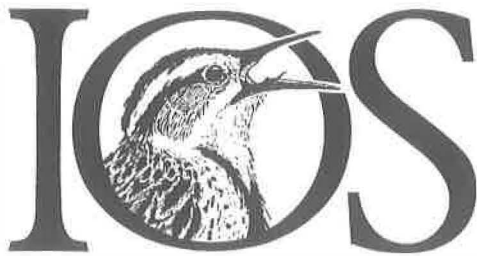

## President's Message

### Dear Members:

On the weekend of April 25-27 the IOS Annual Meeting was held at Giant City State Park in southern Illinois in conjunction with the Birding Fest of Southernmost Illinois. As many of you know the Birding Fest runs a day-long Birding Blitz each year to raise funds for the conservation of the Cache River Watershed.

This year seven teams competed in various categories and included our very own IOS Northern Shrikes: Sheryl DeVore, Susan Kaley, Jeff Smith and Jenny Vogt. The IOS Northern Shrikes joined other teams of prominent birders with heavy IOS membership.

The rivalry of Keith McMullen's Hot Shots and Steve Bailey's Hooters for top honors continues with the Hot Shots recapturing the title with a tally of 163 species in blustery conditions. The total species from all seven teams hit over 190 species! All told the teams raised more than \$4000 for the Friends of the Cache. We will be adding to that total with a contribution of half of the net proceeds from our Annual Meeting.

Our banquet speaker, Dr. Jeff Hoover of the Illinois Natural History Survey gave a very informative and entertaining presentation, which discussed some interesting discoveries arising from multi-year studies of cowbird predation in the Cache River Watershed. Jeff also showed us how a simple stratagem of building gully plugs stopped adjacent wet lands from draining into the Cache River resulting in dramatic increases in the breeding success of species such as the Prothonotary Warbler. The Birding Blitz pledges and the IOS contribution will be spent on building more of these gully plugs.

I am sure I speak for all in attendance in saying that we had another great Annual Meeting professionally run by our Annual Meeting Chair, Jeff Walk and excellent field trips on Saturday and Sunday organized by Field Trip Chair Travis Mahan and led by blitzers Travis, Steve Bailey, Vicki Lang-Mendenhall, Keith McMullen, Rhonda Rothrock, Dan Williams and Geoff Williamson despite early starts after a sleep-deprived Blitz on Friday, and Trevor Hinckley and Don Mullison.

At the Banquet we announced this year's IOS Grant Program winners. You will read in more detail about the awards in a forthcoming issue of the Meadowlark. We were delighted by the record number of applicants this year and were able to make five grants of \$500 each as a result of the generosity of and support from the DuPage Birding Club and Karen and Bob Fisher with Vicky Sroczyński and her husband John Burke, the latter group in memory of their friend Jerry Kumery.

# Calls, captures, and collisions:

## Triangulating three census methods to better understand nightly passage of songbird migrants through the Chicago region during May

### Introduction

Censusing migrant birds is a prime concern of birdwatchers and ornithologists alike, particularly in light of recent population declines reported for some species (National Audubon Society 2005, 2007). The large volume and diversity of birds that pass through the Chicago region each year during migration present a great opportunity for monitoring populations that breed and winter across a wide range of regions and habitats, yet censusing bird populations during migration presents significant technical challenges. Each technique for censusing migrating birds has its own advantages and biases. Some of these biases, such as those for mist netting, are well known. However, other techniques, such as nocturnal flight-call recordings or window-collision monitoring are somewhat newer, and their biases are less well understood. Understanding these biases, and the general correspondence between the data rendered by different migrant bird censusing techniques is an important frontier for improving our ability to monitor migrant bird populations while en route.

As a bird censusing technique, mist-netting has the advantage of a highly standardized sampling structure and effort, yet it also has well-known biases. For instance, mist-netting does not frequently capture larger birds or those that forage in flight; captures consist largely of understory birds found between 2

and 3 m off the ground (Remsen & Good, 1996, Wang & Finch 2002). Mist nets also typically capture only forest species, thus, birds that prefer open areas are under-represented (Derlindati & Caziani 2005).

Recording nocturnal flight calls of migrating birds has recently received a great deal of attention in the birding and ornithological communities because of its potential as an identification and censusing tool. However, this technique is also subject to significant methodological challenges. Migrants can only be reliably heard or recorded when they are flying low, and birds' migration altitude varies depending on weather conditions (Graber & Cochran 1959; Farnsworth 2005). Moreover, even with recent software advances, it is still impossible or extremely difficult to confidently identify many species on the basis of their nocturnal flight calls (Evans and O'Brien 2002, Farnsworth 2005). In addition, variation in calling behavior and frequency further complicate abundance inferences from nocturnal flight call data (Graber and Cochran 1960).

Window-collision bird rescue programs have saved the lives of many birds both directly, and through the attention they have drawn to bird mortality from window collisions, leading to various collision mitigation programs. Such programs also provide scientifically valuable museum specimens, yet bird collision and rescue programs have rarely been exploited as a

source of information for monitoring bird populations. Using window collision data in this way requires an understanding of the biases associated with window-collision bird samples. These biases are poorly known. Graber and Cochran (1959) suggested that some bird species are attracted to tower lights, which might increase the density of these birds in lighted areas. Another study by Graber (1968), along with anecdotal observations, suggest that bird species vary in their susceptibility to window collisions. Some species, such as the Northern (Yellow-shafted) Flicker, are more likely to be stunned or killed in window collisions than others, such as the Black-throated Green Warbler, who are presumably either less likely to suffer significant damage from collisions, better able to avoid collisions in the first place, or both.

The purpose of this study was to triangulate three different methods for measuring the daily flow of migrants through the Chicago region in springtime: Mist-net captures, nocturnal flight call recordings, and window collision rescues/collections. By seeing how these three methods complement, contradict and/or corroborate each other, we aimed to understand better the methodological advantages and limitations inherent in each censusing method, and gain a clearer picture of nightly songbird migrant flow through the Chicago region during the month of May.

## Materials and Methods

We compared daily abundance data from all three census methods for each day during the month of May for the years 2006 and 2007. We excluded all non-migratory species, all non-passerines, and several species whose migration through the Chicago region is almost entirely completed before May. Specific sampling structures for the three techniques are described below.

**Mist-netting:** All mist-netting data for this study came from the Shaw Woods Avian Monitoring Project (SWAMP), a mist-netting station operated each day during May at the Skokie River Nature Preserve in Lake County, Illinois. The study site and methodology of SWAMP are described in Gordon et al. (2002), and Bueter et al. (2006). We used SWAMP mist-net capture data for the 2006 and 2007 seasons, during which 1614, and 2250 net x hours of mist-netting were conducted on 27, and 30 days, respectively.

**Nocturnal Flight Call Recordings:** Calls were recorded from a single location in north suburban Zion, IL, one block west of Sheridan Road, and roughly 2 km west of the Lake Michigan lakefront. The surrounding habitat is residential, with scattered large ornamental and remnant, native deciduous hardwoods. Recordings were made each night between the hours of 8 p.m. and 7 a.m. from 30 April to 30 May 2006 and 2007, with an Audio-technica ATR20 (2006) or ATR30 (2007) microphone, mounted at the focal point of a 24-inch aluminum parabolic reflector. The whole assembly sat approximately 4m above ground, pointing approximately northeast at 30 degrees above the horizon. The microphone was hooked into a VIA AC'97 Audio sound card running in a PC with an AMD Athlon 1800™ processor. Using the program, Syrinx version 2.5q, sampling was performed at a rate of 22050 Hz, and a sonogram file was produced

for any sound with a minimum trigger event duration of 10 ms, minimum sound duration of 30 ms, a maximum gap between trigger events of 100 ms, and a minimum intensity of 40% above ambient sound levels for the frequency range of 2000 to 3800 Hz, or 30% above ambient for the frequency range of 5500 to 12000 Hz. We excluded the 3800 to 5500 Hz frequency range because it was dominated by the calls of fall field crickets (*Gryllus pennsylvanicus*). The only songbird species that appear to be restricted to this range are Least Flycatcher (*Empidonax minimus*) and Eastern Phoebe (*Sayornis phoebe*) (Evans and O'Brien 2002). Both of these species are thought to call in nocturnal flight only rarely (Evans & O'Brien 2002).

The sonograms of all recorded flight calls were identified subsequently by Paul Sweet based on the duration, pitch, and modulation characters described in Evans and O'Brien (2002), and occasionally with the aid of listening directly to the recordings.

## Window Collisions:

We used window collision data for 2006 and 2007 for the month of May from Chicago Bird Collision Monitor and Rescue Project's (CBCMRP) main survey territory, located in downtown Chicago from 700 West to the lakefront East; and from 1000 North to 500 South. Through this program, volunteers patrol accessible areas of ground around buildings and other structures each day to rescue stunned birds and collect birds killed by colliding with windows. The majority (>90%) of active patrols were focused on buildings south of 500 North. Volunteers did not have consistent designated routes but were given maps that indicated the majority of main buildings within this geographic area that they could patrol as often as time, availability, and access allowed.

Birds were retrieved by volunteers with varying degrees of skill in the spotting of dead and injured birds, and the capture of injured birds. Additional birds were picked up by the public or building staff.

Teams of 2-12 volunteers went out every morning, searching on foot or surveying from cars or bicycles.

Typical daily patrols spanned from 4 a.m. (roughly one hour before sunrise) to 9:30 a.m. Patrols extended later into the day when there was elevated bird collision activity, sometimes until 1 p.m. A small number of additional birds were collected during other hours of the day and night when the public or volunteers in the downtown area reported and retrieved birds.

## Results and Discussion

### *Abundance and Composition Patterns:*

Our combined data set consisted of 1432 identified, and 2520 unidentified nocturnal flight calls, 3040 mist-net captures, and 1060 window collisions. Monthly totals are presented for each species, each year, and for each method in Table 1.

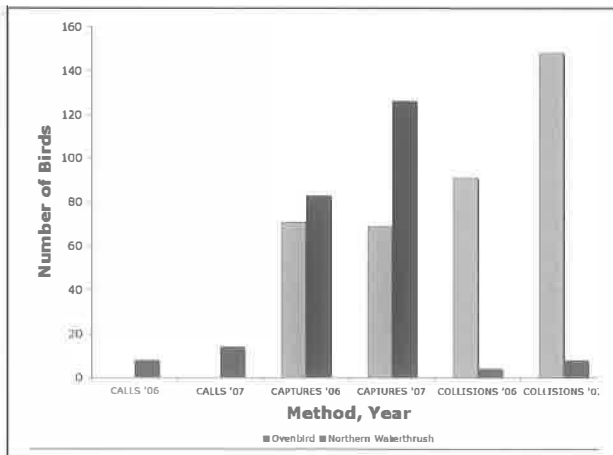
**Figure 1: Daily Totals Across Methods 2006-2007**

Nocturnal flight call recordings produced much higher abundance peaks in both years than did the

other two methods we analyzed (Fig 1). The window-collision data was the flattest method, with mist-netting data showing abundance peaks of intermediate size. There are two principal factors that likely contribute to this variation in peak amplitude.

First, the nocturnal flight call data set has a greater spatiotemporal extent, and therefore samples more birds than do either of the other methods. Even though the microphone is located at a single point in

space, it records a river of birds migrating over that point all night long. Hence, the spatial extent of sampling may be regarded as a linear transect extending the length of an entire night's flight.

In contrast, mist-netting samples contain a snapshot of birds that either landed, or remained within the mist-netting area on a given day. Our window-collision data set also represents a similarly confined snapshot. Many of the buildings in the city of Chicago comply with Chicago

National Audubon Society's Lights Out program. Prior to the full voluntary compliance with this program in 2003, hundreds of dead birds would be recovered by bird collision monitors before dawn from the bases of certain large buildings. Most of these birds had presumably been attracted into, and collided with illuminated buildings during their night flight. Due to the effectiveness of the Lights Out program, migrant mortality rates of birds collected by the CBCMRP have greatly decreased from 80%

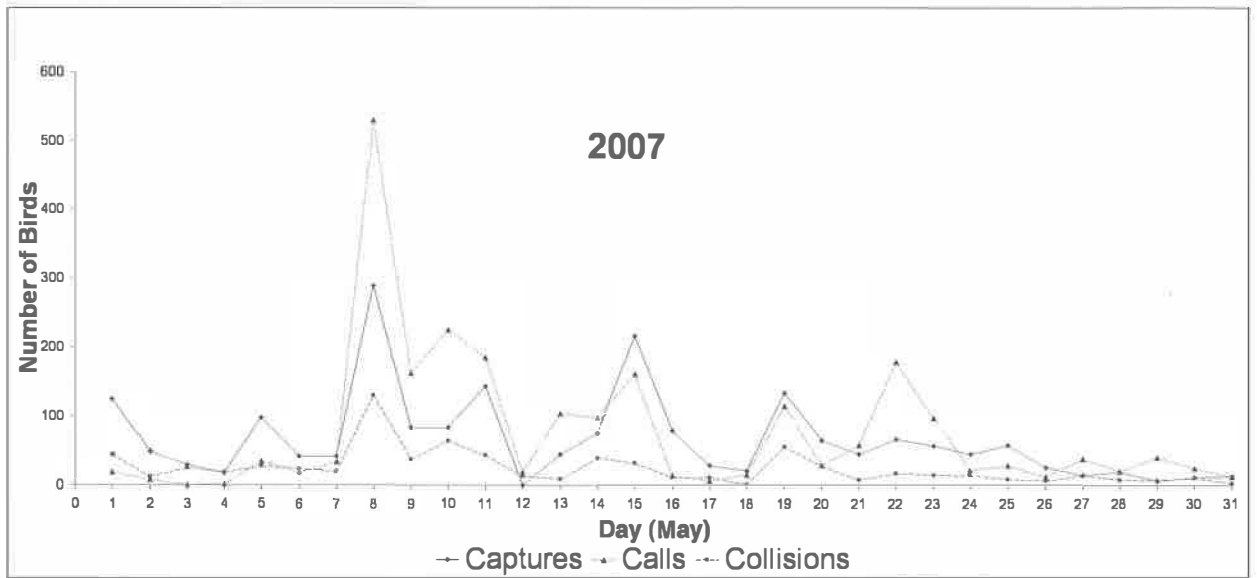
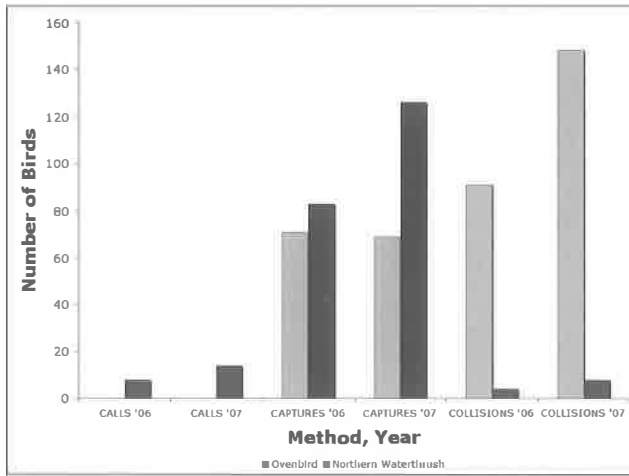
dead and 20% alive before 2003, to 40% dead and 60% live over the past few years. Furthermore, volunteers no longer tend to encounter large piles of dead birds below buildings on the first run of the morning. This suggests that most collisions occur after dawn, hence we conclude that the CBCMRP data set mostly samples the snapshot of migrating birds that have settled in the Chicago loop on a given day, rather than the entire river of migrants that has flown past during the previous night.

Nocturnal flight call data include both identifiable and unidentifiable calls.



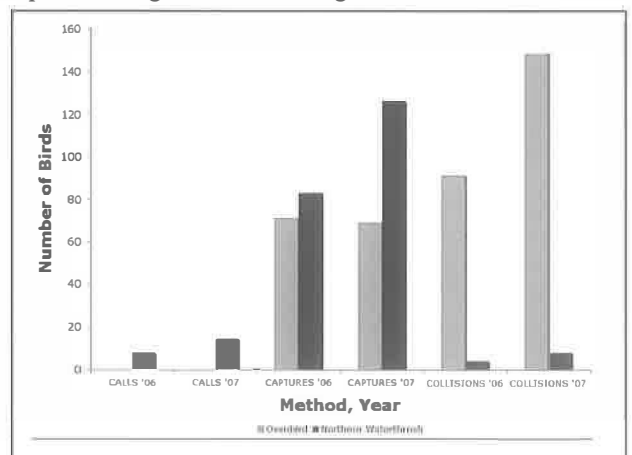
**Figure 2: Totals for each thrush species for each method, each year.**

Another factor that may contribute to lower abundance peaks, particularly in the window-collision data set, is saturation. All three methods are potentially subject to methodological saturation: Flight call recordings if the gaps between calls are shorter than 100 milliseconds, mist-net samples if full nets deter new captures or if capture rates exceed processing capacity, forcing net closure. However, saturation appeared to be more of an issue with window collisions. Mist nets were never closed due to saturation during our study period, and capture rates rarely exceeded two or three birds per net x hour, hence birds were not likely to have been visually repelled by overly full nets. Experience and anecdotal observations suggest that window collision pickup rates may be more strongly affected by saturation. Birds killed or stunned by window collisions quickly fell prey to gulls, raccoons, crows, squirrels, city sweepers, or power washers if volunteers did not recover them soon after the collisions occurred.

The general correspondence of migratory peaks and troughs between methods (Figure 1), suggests overall spatial homogeneity in the density of migrants across the Chicagoland region on any given day. Our nocturnal flight call recordings and mist-net data were collected 40, and 30 miles north of downtown Chicago, respectively, whereas the window collision data are from the downtown Chicago loop. If migrant density were highly patchy at this spatial scale, we would expect to see more disagreement between the migrant abundance peaks recorded in these different localities.

The disagreements in abundance peaks that we did observe (Fig. 1) can mostly be explained as the result of compositional biases across methods. For example, on 21 May 2006, and 15 May 2007, large numbers of Swainson's Thrushes and warblers caused large abundance peaks in the nocturnal flight

call and mist-net data sets (Fig. 1). The lack of peaks in the window collision data set on these days may have resulted from the simple fact that most of the species that came through in big numbers on these days don't tend to hit windows frequently (Table 2). Similarly, large peaks on 25 May 2006 and 19 May 2007 are most pronounced in the mist-net data set, because mist-netting is the only method of these three that effectively samples the Empidonax flycatchers that were present in large numbers on these days.

Our comparisons revealed a strange pattern of methodological bias with respect to thrushes (Fig. 2). Wood Thrushes were recorded in roughly equal abundance in both mist-nets and window collisions, but thrushes in the genus, *Catharus* (Swainson's, Gray-cheeked, Hermit, and Veery) were recorded in much higher abundance with mist-nets than with window collisions. Do *Catharus* thrushes avoid windows? If so, why don't Wood Thrushes? This raises questions about the behavior and habitat selection of migrating thrushes that would be profitable subjects for future study. Nocturnal flight calls of thrushes could potentially shed light on this, as all species give diagnostic calls (Evans and O'Brien 2002). However, our 95% confidence standard allowed us to identify thrush nocturnal flight calls to the species level only for Gray-cheeked and Hermit Thrushes.

We found another curious compositional discrepancy across methods with warblers in the genus, *Seiurus* (Ovenbird and Northern Waterthrush, (Fig. 3). Ovenbird nocturnal flight calls could not be confidently identified, but mist-nets and window collisions recorded similar levels of abundance for this species. In contrast, mist-nets recorded much higher abundances of Northern Waterthrushes than did either of the other methods. Once again, we can only speculate on what caused this pattern. Could

Northern Waterthrushes be much better at avoiding window collisions than are Ovenbirds? Might Northern Waterthrushes congregate at the SWAMP study site through the poorly understood, yet presumably highly constrained process of en route habitat selection?

#### *Compositional Complementarity:*

To better understand the compositional complementarity nature among our three migrant songbird censusing methods, we constructed lists of species over- and under-represented by each method (Table 2). We classified a species as over-represented by a particular method if there were at least three times as many individuals of that species recorded by that method as there were for any of the other two methods in both years (i.e. this difference was observed in each year). We classified a species as under-represented by a particular method if there were fewer than 10 total individuals of that species recorded by that method, excluding species with fewer than 10 records for all methods and years combined.

These comparisons revealed that mist-net and nocturnal flight call data sets were highly complementary in their coverage of species, and that the window collision data set did not provide a significant amount of abundance information for any species not already covered by one of the other two methods (Table 2).

Mist-nets underperformed relative to other methods for 15 species (Table 2). These included open-country species such as swallows, Bobolink, Savannah Sparrow, and American Pipit, as well as a variety of canopy-dwelling species such as Scarlet Tanager and several species of warbler. Mist-nets out-performed other methods for 14 species (Table 2). These were mostly terrestrial and understory species typical of a variety of shrubland and forest habitats, including various thrushes, warblers, and flycatchers in the genus, *Empidonax*.

Nocturnal flight call recordings underperformed other methods for 28 species (Table 2). For 19 of these species, this was due to ambiguity in identifying the nocturnal flight calls (Table 1). The remaining 9 species, including a variety of flycatchers plus kinglets, vireos, and catbirds,

were under-sampled by this method primarily because they are not known to vocalize during their nocturnal migratory flights. Nocturnal flight calls outperformed the other two census methods for 11 species (Table 2). These included open-country species such as Bobolink

and Savannah and Grasshopper Sparrows, as well as several forest canopy-dwelling species such as Scarlet Tanager and several species of warbler. Species overrepresented in our nocturnal flight call data set also paradoxically included several species whose migration is primarily diurnal, and whose vocalizations we recorded primarily between 5 a.m. and 7 a.m.

### Summary:

*What's the best method for censusing migrants?*

Our methodological comparisons suggest that a combination of mist-netting and nocturnal flight call recording would render the most complete and informative overall picture of migratory song-bird abundance, especially if combined with additional methods including analysis of weather radar images and standardized day-time bird observations.

Mist-net data are subject to well-known methodological biases. However, for many shrubland and woodland understory species, mist-net samples are a uniquely valuable censusing method.

The utility of nocturnal flight call recordings as a migrant song-bird censusing technique is significantly limited by identification constraints. Nonetheless, nocturnal flight calls provide an essential complement to mist-net data, particularly for species of open country or forest canopies whose flight calls are species-diagnostic. Moreover, data on unidentifiable nocturnal flight calls add additional information on the overall abundance of migrating birds.

Window collision data sets do not add the capacity to effectively census any additional species not already covered by the former methods. Nonetheless, window collision data may be a valuable source of monitoring data, revealing possible sampling biases in other census methods, and possibly adding power to monitor other migrant species not considered in this study, such as American Woodcock.

**Meadowlark**

Two additional methods warrant mention for their potential to complement the migrant censusing methods we analyzed: Radar images of nocturnal migrants and standardized daytime observations. Radar images cannot normally reveal the species identity of migrating birds, but they can be used to study overall densities of migrating birds over large spans of time and space (Gauthreaux Jr. et al. 2005). As such, they have tremendous value as a

way to analyze overall migrant flow over large areas, and the migration behavior of birds in relation to weather patterns.

Counts based on daytime acoustical/visual observations of birds by experienced observers can provide an important complement to mist-netting and nocturnal flight call recording as a species-specific migrant songbird censusing tool. Many of the species missed by the

latter methods are easily observable and countable, particularly species of the canopy or open country habitat that are either silent, or give unidentifiable calls while migrating at night, such as many species of warblers and vireos. In order to serve as an effective monitoring instrument, such observations would have to be conducted by experienced observers, and be highly standardized in terms of time, space, and sampling effort.

# Summer Tanager visits jelly feeder in DuPage County

On 2007 May 24, while gardening my Woodridge yard in DuPage County, I was serenaded by the melodious song of a Summer Tanager throughout the day. Occasionally I would catch glimpses of the bird, which appeared to be a first-year male, foraging among branches on our white oaks. I hoped he was feasting on the ample crop of 17-year cicadas we were hosting. Knowing the bird was mainly an insectivore, but unsure of the tanager's specific diet, I consulted Kaufman's Lives of North American Birds, and sure enough, cicadas were on the menu! Beetles, caterpillars, grasshoppers, and the Summer Tanager's favorites – bees and wasps – completed the insect foods. Also, small fruits and berries could be taken on occasion.

The next morning, as I had done for most of the month, I set out orange slices and a shallow dish of grape jelly on our platform feeder, hoping to attract Baltimore Orioles. We've had orioles visit the yard

every spring, although never have they visited the oranges or jelly. However, hope springs eternal, so I continued feeding. Imagine my surprise when I observed what appeared to be a very large House Finch at the grape jelly. Anyway, that was the first thought that crossed my mind, since I certainly wasn't expecting the Summer Tanager on the feeder. But, indeed, the young male was feasting on grape jelly.

For the next three days, the Summer Tanager was on the platform enjoying the grape jelly. Generally, he would visit every half hour or so. During this time, the weather was warm and clear. The last visit was on the evening of 27 May. The next morning, we were disappointed that he was gone. I wished him a safe journey and



hoped the jelly provided energy to help him on his way.

Curious as to whether this feeding was a rare occurrence, I searched the Web for references of tanagers at jelly feeders. I found several incidents: Summer Tanagers in Wisconsin 20-22 May 2005 (birdforum.net) and in Maine 26 May 2005 (BirdEast Hotline). Scarlet Tanagers were at jelly feeders in Minnesota on 26 May 2004 (moumn.org) and 12 May 2007 (NewsHopper Publications) and in Wisconsin on 28 May 2004 (BirdChat). On a more exotic note, a Western Tanager visited a jelly feeder in Grand Rapids, Minnesota on 12 May 2006, as reported by Bonnie DeLare of the MN DNR. So it does appear that tanagers in general will take jelly from feeders, at least during spring migration.

This spring, I'm going to put out several dishes of grape jelly!

# The 2007 Illinois Statewide Spring Bird Count

## Introduction

The 36th running of Illinois' annual Spring Bird Count, first run in 1972, was completed on Saturday, 5 May 2007. It was a great day for birds, birders and birding. The weather was mild and the birds, at least the edge and woodland species, such as the warblers, vireos, buntings, grosbeaks and sparrows, were so plentiful that several new records were established for the number of counties reporting them. Karen Forcum (Shelby County) reports that "2007 was our best year ever – a perfect day including a fall-out; warblers were low and singing." Although there were good numbers of non-woodland species as well, those numbers failed to reach record status and, as such, leave the impression that birders stopped counting after birding the morning woods. There wasn't a single new shorebird record (does that mean low numbers were present on count day?). Despite the large quantity of birds and fairly large number of birders, the traditionally high species counts for Lake and Cook counties (both of which have exceeded 200 species

in the past) were 20 – 30 species under 200 this year. However, the Townsend's Warbler in Cook County (a first for the count) added excitement. The Golden Eagle (in Montgomery County) was another first for the count. The Black-throated Gray Warbler (in Douglas County) is the second count occurrence for this species, the first was in Cook County in 1984. And, we welcomed back the Gray Partridge (two counties) after a two-year hiatus as well as the Bewick's Wren. Central Illinois birders were somewhat plagued by biting insects locally called "buffalo gnats" – as a result, some observers specifically mentioned that they spent more time birding by car than they did walking.

Once again, with the help of Mike Ward and the Illinois Natural History Survey, we fully anticipated participation in all 102 counties this year – compilers and observers were confirmed. Unfortunately, as last year, we ended up two counties short. We appreciate the support and assistance of those individuals (often serving as the sole participant) who helped achieve this goal –

especially those who traveled quite some distance. This year the nine counties represented by a single observer reported from 55 to 160 species; their average was 106 species.

## Results and Discussion

Count day began with early morning temperatures in the low to mid 50s in the northwest and the upper 50s to low 60s in the south. Temperatures peaked in the mid to upper 60s and low 70s in the north to the upper 70s and low 80s in the south. Winds were mostly light (less than 10 mph with occasional gusts up to 25-30 mph) and highly variable (but nearly half the reports indicating they were from the east or southeast). The morning sky was mostly cloudy to overcast (73 counties); however, by afternoon the sky had changed to partly cloudy to clear. An early to mid-morning fog was reported from 29 mid-state counties. Fourteen counties, in the northeast and extreme southeast, reported a trace of rain during the early morning hours; however, it did not interfere with the birding.

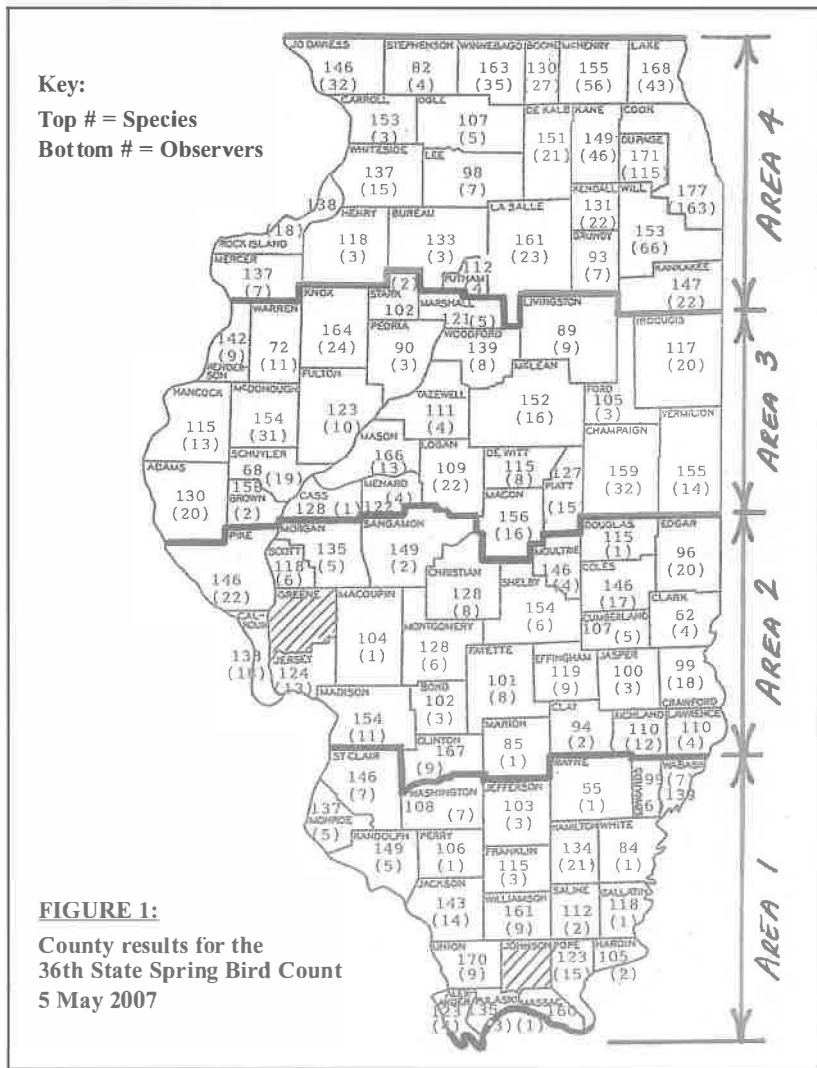

Counters in Clinton, DeKalb and Massac counties began at midnight; counting had begun by 3 a.m. in 12 more counties and by 5 a.m. in another 47. Overall, 64 counties recorded at least some pre-dawn owling hours (before 5:30 a.m.). Of the remaining 36 counties, most began at dawn or shortly thereafter; only 13 began as late as 6 a.m. or later and the latest starting time was 7:30 a.m. At least 28 counties recorded owling hours after dusk with 12 continuing as late as 10 p.m. and one until midnight. The final tally of statewide owling time was 160 hours.

As usual, **Figure 1** is a visual reference to how well we did. The larger number in each county is the number of species reported in the county; the smaller number (in parentheses) is the number of observers. Figure 1 makes it easy to compare county results and to identify those counties where more assistance would be welcomed – especially those with four or fewer observers (note Greene County in particular) and fewer than 100 species.

**Table 1** compares the overall Count results with those of the past two years and the record year. This year was a record-setting year in 4 of the 16 listed categories. This year also marks the first time that 60 species were recorded in 90 or more counties and the first time 85 participating counties recorded 100 or more species. The other two records established new high averages for the number of species per county. The 2007 mark of 267 species was only two short of the 1996 record; however, this year's tally could have been 272 (or higher) had appropriate documentations been received for five submitted species and if some of the rarer, but known to be present, species had been found. With the great influx of songbirds this year, the total number of birds recorded was only 31,000 short of the 1996 record. The number of participants rebounded to what it was two years ago, and 70 more than last



year. The total number of party miles (heavy on the driving side) was very close to the 2001 record. And, the records show that there's been a steady gain in the number of party hours walked the last couple of years (which may be the result of two good-weather years).

**Table 2** identifies those counties with 150 or more species. Cook County retained the premier position with a "mere" 177 species (which is 9 fewer than last year and 14 fewer than 2005); the Townsend's Warbler and Le Conte's Sparrow were the only species attributed solely to Cook County. Lake County, which usually challenges Cook, ended up with only 168

species, way low for this traditionally high-count county; the two Lake County-only species were the Greater Scaup and Brewer's Blackbird. In the other AREA 4 counties, DuPage was second with 171 species and was followed with 150 or more species by six other counties. Clinton County led the AREA 2 & 3 counties with 167 species; Mason was a very close second with 166; there were nine more central counties achieving 150 or more species. Union County led the AREA 1 counties with 170 species (and could have been 172 if two requested documentation forms had been provided); it was followed by two more with 150 or more species. Massac County's impressive tally of 160 species was achieved by a single observer. For the record, another 11 counties provided a confirmed list of 140 to 149 species. The record species count for a single county remains at 205 (set in 1983).

**Table 3** identifies, in descending order, the counties with 20 or more participants. The list this year contains 22 counties; Cook and DuPage continue to field 100 or more partic-

ipants. After the two high counts the number of participants in each county declines sharply.

**Table 4** provides the usual comparisons of birding efforts in each quarter of the state—identified in Figure 1 as AREAS 1 through 4 (south to north). In 2007, the average number of party hours per county was 51.5 (up from the 48.9 of 2006 but similar to the 51.8 of 2005).

**Table 5** identifies the 60 species reported from 90 (90%) or more of the reporting counties. Only 18 (30%) of these were reported from all 100 counties; another 9 (15%) were reported from all but one county. As has become typical, some species such as the Mallard, American Kestrel, Rock Pigeon, Chimney Swift, Northern Flicker, Horned Lark, Purple Martin, Tufted Titmouse, House Wren, Eastern Bluebird, White-throated Sparrow and House Finch escape detection in some of the counties. This year the missing list even includes the American Goldfinch and House Sparrow.

**Table 6** shows, in descending order, the 20 most commonly reported species. The Red-winged Blackbird retained its top position and the next nine continue to be much the same year after year. However, the grackle and starling moved back into second and third place, respectively, and the robin returned to the fourth position. The Canada Goose is now entrenched in the fifth position despite its "decline" of more than a 1000 birds this year. The House Sparrow, which is often reported in numbers similar to those of the Canada Goose on the

Spring Bird Count, took a major hit this year (2500 fewer birds); that dropped it to the eighth position. A first-time presence in the top ten was achieved by the Brown-headed Cowbird as a result of the record number reported for this species; it jumped all the way up to the sixth position. Even the American Gold-

finch moved ahead of the House Sparrow this year. The Ring-billed Gull, in ninth position, is down about 800 birds and the Northern Cardinal, in tenth position showed a gain of about 500 birds. The lower 10 of the top 20 continues to show considerable variation. The two species on last year's list that did not

make it this year are the Mallard and Song Sparrow (and both would have made the list if it was the top 22 species). The 2007 additions are the Blue Jay (missing only last year) and White-crowned Sparrow – on the list for only the second time. For those who keep track, the American Crow ranked 25th this year (and missed the list for the fourth consecutive year). The cormorant, which ranked high for several years, achieved the 23rd position. During the Count's 36-year history, 43 species have appeared in the top 20 list. Eight species have made the list only one time.

**Table 7** provides the maximum species details for the number of counties reporting the species; the total number of birds of each species reported; and the highest number of each species recorded in a single county (including the county in which that number was recorded.) Some of the notable single-county records were the two new count species: Townsend's Warbler and Golden Eagle as well as Western Grebe, Purple Gallinule, Least Tern, Bewick's Wren, Black-throated Gray Warbler, and Lapland Longspur. Some of the better records for the 10 species reported from only two counties were Gray Partridge and Smith's Longspurs. Also included in the Table (at the end) are those species that are not officially countable in Illinois and treated as exotics; this year this list is limited to just the Ringed Turtle-Dove. As for the European Goldfinches of the past three years, if they were present this year, they did not get reported.

**New Records.** Table 7 also identifies all new and tied count records for each species. As expected, new records are more difficult to achieve each year and when achieved, they most often surpass the previous record by only a small margin. The 78 new records (the largest number in several years) have been identified by an asterisk (\*) in the Table; the 28 tied records, by a pound (#) sign. Had there been participants in all 102 counties the number of new

records would have been even greater. There were 45 new records for the Number of counties reporting the species. Some of the largest or most interesting increases in the number of counties were for: Mute Swan (up 4), Bald Eagle (up 3), Northern Harrier (up 8), Cooper's Hawk (up 3), Sora (up 6), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 10 – how long will it be before it is reported from all 102 counties?), Pileated Woodpecker (up 3), Blue-headed Vireo (up 5), Carolina Wren (up 5), Sedge Wren (up 2), Swainson's Thrush (up 4), Nashville Warbler (up 3), Northern Parula (up 4), Black-throated Green Warbler (up 4),

Yellow-throated Warbler (up 4), and Worm-eating Warbler (up 5). There were 22 new records for the Total count of birds reported for those species in a single count year. Some of the largest or most interesting new high counts were for: Snow Goose (up 64 birds), Trumpeter Swan (up 4 birds), Canvasback (up 19 birds), American White Pelican (up 415 birds – after an increase of 598 birds last year), Turkey Vulture (up 151 birds), Cooper's Hawk (up 29 birds), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 77 birds), White-eyed Vireo (up 362 birds), Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (up 83 birds), Blue-winged Warbler (up 20 birds), Northern Parula (up

298 birds), Prairie Warbler (up 87 birds), Louisiana Waterthrush (up 53 birds), Eastern Towhee (up 110 birds), White-crowned Sparrow (up 322 birds), Rose-breasted Grosbeak (up 415 birds), Indigo Bunting (up 448 birds), and Brown-headed Cowbird (up 3185 birds). There were 11 new records for the Total number of birds reported for those species in a single county. Some of the largest or most interesting records were for: Snow Goose (up 19 birds), Canvasback (up 13 birds), Turkey Vulture (up 30 birds), Ruby-throated Hummingbird (up 65 birds), Pine Warbler (up 9 birds), and Indigo Bunting (up 188 birds)

**Species Comments.** Both the Blue Jay and American Crow numbers remain subpar; however, Spring Bird Count records show that the total number of jays is 23% higher than last year and crows only slightly lower (less than 1%) than last year. There were 67 more Red-headed Woodpeckers reported this year than last year (a positive 4%) but the numbers are still only one third of those reported on the Count 30 years ago. Welcome back to the Gray Partridge (Boone and DeKalb counties) and Bewick's Wren (Alexander County). The Townsend's Warbler in Cook County was well-documented by a photograph. If the unidentified swan reported from Cook County was really a Tundra as some people

thought, it would have added another species to the count total. With the addition of Townsend's Warbler and Golden Eagle to the SBC list, the statewide accumulative Count total now stands at 328.

**Species Missed.** The Swainson's Hawk has not been counted for two consecutive years. Other species that would have increased the 2007 list include Common Goldeneye, Eared Grebe, either godwit, Whimbrel,, more shorebirds, Laughing or any "winter" gull, Short-eared Owl, Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow and Red Crossbill. Of course, many county lists could have been enhanced as well had some of the local species known to be present been findable on count day.

**Table 8** provides all the county statistics. The columns are: 1) the county name; 2) the AREA (1, 2, 3 or 4) of the state in which the county occurs; 3) the number of confirmed species identified; 4) the number of countable birds reported; 5) the number of participating birders in the county; 6) the number of parties counting birds; 7) the earliest and latest birding times (in the 24-hour system with owling hours marked with an asterisk "\*"); 8) the number of party miles walked (W) and driven (D); 9) the number of party hours walked (W) and driven (D); and 10) the 2007 county compiler/coordinator.

**Documentation.** The majority of birds requiring documentation were properly documented again this year; those documentations have been forwarded to the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee for the permanent file. Unfortunately, the documentations for five significant Count day species were not received as required (despite several requests); so, those records (along with other poorly- and non-documented records throughout the state) had to be excluded from the report. One of the above five would have been a new count species and the collective total would have provided a possible new count record of 272 species. With the aforementioned exclusions, the number of species

printed in Table 8 will be lower than originally submitted by those county compilers.

**Economic Considerations.** As mentioned last year, birders spend a great deal of time and money in pursuit of birds. It's still impossible to get (or give) exact figures and no one has yet suggested alternate figures, so, the three arbitrary standards and designated values initiated last year will be used again this year: 1) an "average" value for a person's time - \$18/hour; 2) the price of gasoline (which continued to be about \$3 per gallon in early May) or the mileage reimbursement rate for using a vehicle (40 cents per mile); and 3) the cost of food and

drink (average of \$16 per person). And, as last year, there are several other figures that could and should be included in this compilation, i.e., motels or other overnight accommodations, variable pre- and post-count expenses, unrecorded mileage to and from the count site, equipment, apparel, etc. However, we'll keep it simple (if that is possible).

1) 1,426 participants times an average of \$16 for food/drink consumption = \$ 22,816

2) an average of 7.2 participation hours per person (1426) times \$18 per hour [7.2 is based 5153 daylight party hours x 2.0 persons per party + 160 nocturnal party hours] = \$187,690

3) 23,739 miles driven times \$0.40 per mile = \$9,500

(or, alternative: about 24,000 miles at 20 miles per gallon times \$3.00 per gallon = \$3600)

Based on the above computations, plus the added time and mileage required for everyone to drive to and from the count site, the nocturnal miles (which were not included in the mileage above), compilers time and expenses in preparing for and following up after the count, and other unlisted, but real expenses, the estimated economic "input" for the 2007 Spring Bird Count certainly exceeds

\$250,000 and may be more than \$300,000. If there's anyone out there who is able to enhance this concept and offer some better standards and guidelines—please offer them.

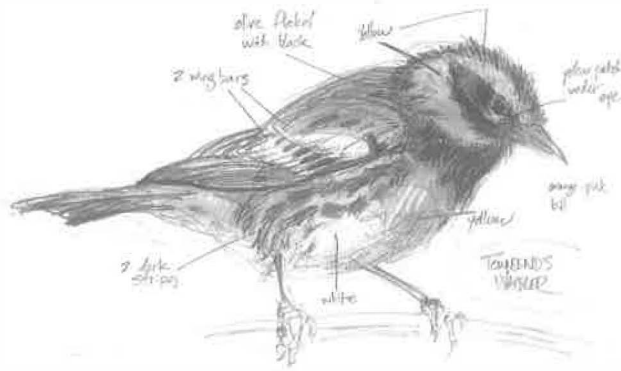

# Field Notes

## The 2007 spring migration season

The spring of 2007 yielded reports of 15 species listed on the Illinois Review List, which was established and is maintained by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee (IORC). Species included on the Review List must be thoroughly documented by the observer(s) and subsequently reviewed by the IORC in order for the report to be accepted into the permanent record of Illinois' avifauna. Some of the 15 review list species reported this spring were represented by multiple individuals statewide. Unfortunately, many of these reports were not documented. It is highly encouraged that observers complete documentation for any review list species encountered in the field so that the state can maintain a continuum of quality data and establish patterns of vagrancy for these rarely encountered species.

Temperatures through the first half of February were below to well below normal for central and northern Illinois, but the southern stretches of the state maintained essentially average temperatures. The latter half of February yielded more typical temperatures statewide. Few weather systems provided conditions favorable for migratory movement, a fact that was evident by the paucity of reports of migratory activity throughout the month. Reports of roughly 30 species were received as February arrivals, the earliest of which followed the first onset of southerly winds from 10-12 February. As is typical of most years, this early push was dominated by waterfowl, which advance northward as soon as warmer temperatures thaw ice, providing open water. The most notable species reported from this early surge was a Black Scoter along Lake Michigan. Following a series of low pressure systems that passed through the state after 16 February, statewide temperatures recovered to normal following one of the coldest periods of the month. Temperatures remained static from about 19 February through the end of the month, but the low pressure systems offered some south winds that produced a trickle of zealous migrants. The highlight of February migration was a well-documented adult Black-headed Gull that remained at Chicago's Montrose Harbor from 23 February through at least 25 March. (See article in Meadowlark 16: 3)

March began with some very gusty westerly winds following a brief show of southerly air that occurred with a strong low pressure system that passed through the state from 28 February through about 4 March. Heavy rains of up to one inch were noted in more northerly locations during this time period. This system caused temperatures to drop down into the teens throughout much of the state on the night of 4 March, but temperatures quickly recovered to normal by 5 March. From about 9-14 March, statewide temperatures surpassed normal highs

with some areas reporting temperatures above 75°F from 12-14 March. North winds followed the passage of this low pressure system, which stabilized temperatures to normal through the period of 15-18 March. Sustained south winds through the last half of March provided favorable conditions for migrants. The warmest period statewide occurred from about 24-27 March, when temperatures exceeded 80°F in some areas. More than 110 species were reported as arriving in March, and some of these were record early: Green Heron (24 March), Marbled Godwit (25 March), Western Sandpiper (30 March), Wilson's Phalarope (26 March), Caspian Tern (26 March), and Sedge Wren (23 March).

The beginning of April maintained the high-temperature trend that persisted through the latter half of March. Temperatures in southern Illinois surpassed 80°F while northern and central Illinois reported temperatures above 70°F through 3 April. This brief period contained some strong winds from the south to southwest. However, a decimating cold front hit the state on 4 April causing temperatures to rapidly plummet below freezing in some areas. Much of the emerging vegetation in the state was affected by frost, especially in southern Illinois where many trees were barren of leaves later in the season. This unseasonable cold spell passed by 10 April, but another less severe cold front occurred from 12-14 April following a strong low-pressure system. Precipitation during this period was among the highest noted all month. Two periods during the latter half of April yielded south winds and above-normal temperatures: 20-24 and 28-30 April. These periods were marked by a heavy flow of a variety of migrants. Exceptional reports during the month of April included record early arrivals of Hudsonian Godwit (12 April), Ruby-throated Hummingbird (5 April), Eastern Kingbird (4 April), Philadelphia Vireo (23 April), and Prothonotary Warbler (2 April). A number of species on the Illinois Review List were reported in April; the following were accompanied by documentation: Black Rail in Fayette County, Snowy Plover in Macon County, White-winged Dove and Barn Owl at Chicago, and a Lazuli Bunting in Winnebago County.

May produced less dramatic temperature swings than those in April. Consistent east winds dominated 1-7 May, which maintained temperatures at normal levels for the statewide Spring Bird Count held on 5 May. A low pressure system that entered the state on 7 May brought temperatures up to the 80s statewide and held them above average from about 7-11 May. Northern Illinois reported temperatures above 90°F during this period. On 13-15 May, an additional warm front passed through the state that produced more south winds and high tempera-

tures. A brief drop in temperatures, some below average, followed with the progression of this system through 16-18 May. From about 19 May to the end of the month, winds essentially remained constant from the south, consequently yielding steady temperatures at, or above, average. There were many noteworthy reports (some not documented or yet reviewed by IORC) in May: a Tricolored Heron and a Reddish Egret along Lake Michigan, several Glossy Ibis, a Swallow-tailed Kite in Lake County, several extralimital Mississippi Kites, a late Prairie Falcon in Fayette County, a Black Rail in Lake County, a Purple Gallinule at its traditional Mermet Lake haunt, an additional

Snowy Plover, more White-winged Doves, a very cooperative Townsend's Warbler in Cook County, Painted Buntings in Cook County, and Great-tailed Grackles at both extremes of the state. Some of the species listed as noteworthy (above) are found in brackets without the observer's initials in the report since they have either not been fully documented or accepted by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee.

At least 58 migratory species persisted in Illinois into June. Of these lingering migrants were 10 species of shorebird, 7 species of flycatchers, and 17 species of warblers. The most significant of these June reports consisted of: a Snowy Plover

Words referring to topographic features are generally not abbreviated in names of residential communities (thus, Forest Park, River Forest, Garden Prairie, etc.). Headings for species requiring IORC (Illinois Ornithological Records Committee) review in parts of Illinois or in some plumages are underlined, while those for species requiring review of all records are CAPITALIZED AND UNDERLINED. in Sangamon County (4 June), a Baird's Sandpiper in St. Clair County (1 June), a Western Kingbird at Illinois Beach State Park (9 June), and a very tardy Cape May Warbler in Winnebago County (17 June).

Records not contained in original submissions by some of the cited observers in this report were contributed by local sub-compilers for Chicago's Jackson Park (fide PRC), Chicago Bird Collision Monitoring (fide AP), and Coles County (fide LBH). Several reports included in this compilation were extracted from text within correspondence to an electronic mailing list titled Illinois Birders Exchanging Thoughts (IBET). Dan Kassebaum provided useful historical summaries of Illinois data on warblers, in particular. Many of the remarks regarding specific weather patterns as well as historical references to such were guided by data found at [www.wunderground.com](http://www.wunderground.com).

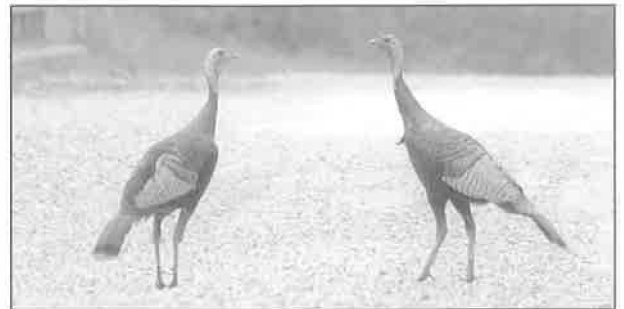

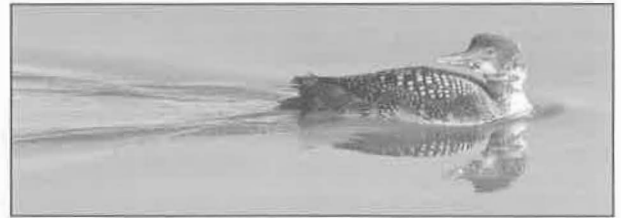

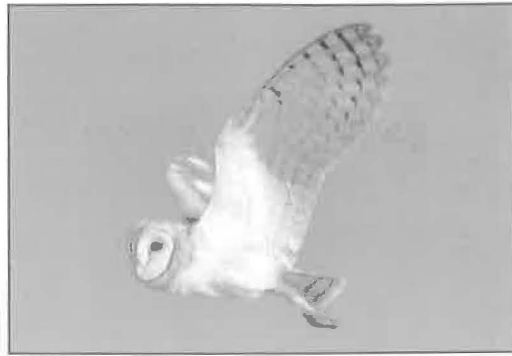
